Horace Pettit, M.D., husband of Millicent Lewis Pettit, was on December 4th elected president of the Pennsylvania Chapter of the United World Federalists. The Ardmore Chronicle said under the heading "Gladwyne Civic Leader Is State World Federalist Head": "Dr. Horace Pettit, of Gladwyne, for many years a Lower Merion resident and a former vice-president of the Gladwyne Civic Association, was elected president of the Pennsylvania Chapter of the United World Federalists at that Organization's convention in Harrisburg, Saturday. 'I am interested in this movement because it is the greatest

preventative medicine ever undertaken, Dr. Pettit told the Chronicle. A graduate of Harvard University and its Medical School, he is on the staff of the Province. versity and its Medical School, he is on the staff of the University Hospital and Medical School and of the Bryn Mawr Hospital. In 1935, Dr. Pettit and Dr. Sargent Pepper, of Haverford were flown to Alaska to take influenza specimens from Eskimos. These were used by the Rockefeller Foundation in its studies. During the last war, Dr. Pettit served in the U.S. Army Medical Corps in India. He outlined the program of the UWF as seeking the strengthening of the United Nations by giving it powers to enforce peace; this would mean a limited world government with law and order enforced by police on the world level to prevent war. He said that Premier Nehru, of India, has endorsed this principle as has Eisenhower in a recent book. The group has won endorsement in fifteen state referendums and won eleven and a half to one in Connecticut this year. In Pennsylvania, the organization seeks to have a referendum on the proposition it favors, and to get the State Legislature to pass a favorable resolution. Although born in Philadelphia in 1903, Dr. Pettit has lived all his life in Lower Merion Township. He lived for many years in Haverford, moving to Gladwyne nine years ago. In 1922, when Dr. Pettit graduated from the Montgomery School, now the Montgomery Country Day School he was awarded the American Legion medal as an outstanding student. He lives with his wife, Millicent Lewis Pettit formerly of Overbrook and Haverford, at 701 W. Conshohocken State rd. The Pettits have four children, Horace, Jr., Norman, now a private by enlistment in the United States Army Air Force, stationed in California, Mrs. Gordon Whitney, Port Chester, N.Y., and Deborah, a student at Gunston School, Maryland."

Murray Sargent, Jr., as of January 1949, has formed a partnership with Nicholas R. Doman for the general practice of law under the firm name of Sargent & Doman, with offices at 60 Wall Street, New York 5, N.Y. (Telephone Whitehall 4-2626). Murray received his B.A. degree from Yale in 1935 and his LL.B degree from Harvard in 1938. Except during his army service, in which he attained the rank of major in the Air Forces, Murray has since practiced law in New York City. He lives with Lucy, his wife, and their two sons, Robin and Tommy, at 17 East 87th Street.

Stevia W. Sargent, daughter of J. Weir Sargent, is a student at the Shipley School. In response to ye editor's query about her school activities she reported "Am in Chorus, Special Chorus (made up of 20 chorus people), Political Discussion Group. Am Sports Editor for our class newspaper (the only class paper in the school). I was fullback on Varsity Hockey team, and am on First Basketball squad." She wrote to ye editor from Haverford, Pa., on January 3d: "We went up to Aunt Louise and Uncle Bill Hinkley's this year for Xmas, and I thought that you might be interested in some of the happenings there. We had dinner with Uncle Bill at Rockefeller Center, and then walked up Broadway. Susie and I made a record, and had our picture taken on the way. We got home about 10:30 after a most exciting and interesting day. My stay there was wonderful; they all look fairly healthy and quite happy, and it was terribly nice seeing them again and getting to know them better. Happy New Year to, you; here's to your wonderful job doing Sargentrivia!

The third (and final) instalment of the fragmentary diary of Hannah Sargent (1754-1847) follows. The earlier portions appeared in Sargentrivia of October 26th and November 16th. This last instalment begins in October 1791 and ends abruptly in July 1793. Until her marriage the diarist lived in Leicester, Mass., with her father, Joseph Sargent (1716-1802), her stepmother, two younger half sisters (Patty and Rachel) and her half brother Stephen. Patty (known also as Martha) and Rachel never married. They continued to live in the house after their father's death. Both died in May 1831, eleven days apart. The house is not now standing. Stephen married and moved away from Leicester. As mentioned in the diary, Hannah was married to William Waite May 27, 1792, and moved to New Braintree, Mass. His sister Mary married Nathan Sargent, Hamnah's first cousin. William was the eighth of the twelve children of Nathaniel Waite, who died in Leicester in 1791 at the age of 90, and, according to Washburn's History of Leicester, "never having been sick a day in his life, and was followed to his grave by all the *** twelve children".
