BEFORE ENTERING ON DUTIES IN THE SOUTH HE SPENT A BRIEF PERIOD IN NEW HAVEN. "THE SARGENT FAMILY WAS A LARGE ONE — ALL SONS AND SONS—IN—LAW OF THE FOUNDER, JOSEPH B. SARGENT, WHO WAS NOW DECEASED. THE PRESIDENT WAS HIS OLDEST SON, HENRY B. SARGENT, A MAN OF CONSIDERABLE CHARM AND ERUDITION. IN FACT, CHARM WAS INBRED IN EVERY MEMBER OF THE SARGENT FAMILY THAT! KNEW, SONS AND GRANDSONS. THEY WERE DELIGHTFUL PEOPLE TO WORK FOR. H.B.S. WAS A PROFESSORIAL TYPE AND I LOVED TO SIT SILENTLY BY IN THE EVENING LISTENING TO HIM TALK. HE HAD A GREAT FUND OF WISDOM AND KNOWLEDGE. HIS HEALTH WAS ROBUST AND HE NEVER WORE AN OVERCOAT, EVEN IN THE SEVEREST WEATHER. THE SARGENTS WERE ALWAYS INTERESTED IN THE SOUTH AND THE FIRM HAD A FINE REPUTATION IN THAT AREA. DURING THE TRYING DAYS FOLLOWING THE WAR BETWEEN THE STATES, THEY HAD EXTENDED LIBERAL TERMS TO MANY FIRMS TO ENABLE THEM TO SURVIVE AND I FOUND EVIDENCES OF APPRECIATION OF THIS WHEN I TRAVELED ON MY NEW TERRITORY."

SARGENT & COMPANY OF NEW HAVEN FIRST BEGAN TO MAKE PAPER BOXES REQUIRED FOR THE BUSINESS IN 1880. IN DECEMBER 1879 THE THIRD FLOOR IN THE FORMER PAVILION HOTEL, RECENTLY USED TO HOUSE FAMILIES OF EMPLOYEES, WAS FITTED UP FOR THE PURPOSE. HENRY ODENKIRCHEN WAS THE FIRST FOREMAN OF THE PAPER BOX DEPARTMENT IN WHAT WAS NOW CALLED BUILDING X. ANOTHER EXTRACT FROM THE DIARY OF LIEUT. COL. JOSEPH SCRANTON TATE, JR., UNDER DATE OF DECEMBER 30, 1942, OPERATING FROM A BASE IN NORTH AFRICA, FOLLOWS.

"IT IS HARD TO BELIEVE THAT THE YEAR IS DRAWING SO NEAR ITS END. TIME AS SUCH HAS MORE OR LESS CEASED TO BE FOR ME. FOUR MONTHS HAVE CERTAINLY CROSSED ME UP. I HAVEN'T KNOWN WHAT DAY OF THE WEEK IT IS FOR AT LEAST THREE OF THE FOUR MONTHS AND FURTHERMORE I HAVE HARDLY BEEN INTERESTED. I GUESS WE WILL GO OUT AGAIN TOMORROW. THEY SEEM TO BE WORKING US ON A SCHEDULE OF TWO DAYS REST AFTER EVERY LONG RAID. WE HARDLY NEED THAT. I EXPECT THE PLANES NEED IT MORE THAN WE DO. I HAVE CERTAINLY BEEN GETTING MY SHARE OF SLEEP DOWN HERE. TODAY I SLEPT LATE AGAIN AND AFTER DINNER SAT AROUND TALKING WITH STEW AND JOHN MURPHY ABOUT ABOU SUER AS IT NOW SEEMS TO BE SPELLED. THEY HAVE CHANGED THE SYSTEM ON THOSE DAY OF REST THINGS. IT NOW TURNS OUT THAT WE CANNOT TAKE OUR OWN PLANES DOWN THERE BUT MUST LOAD TWO CREWS ON ONE DC 3 - WHICH MAKES IT IMPOSSIBLE FOR A COUPLE OF MEN TO GO BECAUSE A DC 3 ISN'T SUPPOSED TO CARRY MORE THAN A SET NUMBER. SINCE TWO CREWS GO A DAY - BOTH FROM THE SAME SQUADRON - AND ONE SET FROM MY SQUADRON HAS ALREADY GONE TODAY TWO FROM THE 409TH LEFT, TOMORROW TWO FROM THE 330TH THEN RIGGS AND PAT MURPHY, THEN ANOTHER 409TH AND ANOTHER 330TH SET AND THEN PROBABLY RINAHART AND I OR RINAHART AND SMS IT WILL BE AT LEAST JANUARY 4TH AND PROBABLY JANUARY SEVENTH BEFORE I GET TO GO --- YOW! THAT MEANS AT LEAST 14 DAYS WITHOUT A BATH AND PROBABLY SEVENTEEN! AFTER THIS FIRST GO ROUND IT IS TO BE ARRANGED THAT EACH CREW GETS A THREE DAY LEAVE IN EITHER ALEXANDRIA OR CAIRO! SO THEY SAY. I SUPPOSE IT WILL BE JUST ABOUT OUR TURN WHEN IT COMES TIME TO PULL UP STAKES AND GO BACK TO ENGLAND. WELL !
