WEDDING AT ST. JOHN'S CHURCH IN WATER-BURY.

The marriage of Miss Mary E. Kingsbury, eldest daughter of the Hon. Frederick J. Kingsbury, to Dr. Charles Stedman Bull, of New-York. was celebrated at 11 o'clock this morning at St. John's Church. By the time of the entrance of the bridal party the church was completely filled throughout. The chancel had been elaborately and tastefully dressed with flowers. There were included potted plants and bridal wreaths, snow-balls, and other designs, those of honeysuckles and horse-chestnut blossoms being especially beautiful. The pulpit and lectern were bright with various designs of roses. The entrance of the bridal party was by the side door, the brides-maids—the Misses Kingsbury, sisters of the bride, Miss Alice Kingsbury, dressed in pink, and Miss Edith Kingsbury, in blue—coming first, followed by the bride, who was dressed in ivory-white satin, leaning upon the arm of her father, the six ushers last, who stationed themselves outside the railing near the pulpit. At the rail the party were met by Dr. Bull, the bridegroom, and his best man, Mr. Samuel P. Pope, of New-York, who had taken their station there some time before. These gentlemen, as well as the ushers, wore the ordinary morning dress. The impressive ceremony of the Episcopal Church was performed by Bishop Williams, assisted by the Rev. Prof. Russell and the Rev. R. R. Converse, Rector of the church. The more intimate relatives and friends, including the guests from out of town, afterward assembled at the house, where the wedding breakfast was served. The presents displayed were unusually numerous, beautiful, and costly. The bride and bridegroom left at 2 o'clock for the East in the Directors' car of the New-England Road, placed at their disposal by the courtesy of President Wilson.
