Her veil, which was also her mother's bridal veil, was fastened to the coiffure with a tiara of diamonds. The tiara was the gift of her mother. A diamond half-moon, the bridegroom's gift, was fastened to the bodice of the wedding gown.

The bridesmaids wore gowns of white silk muslin and large white hats, trimmed with white plumes, golden butterflies, and buttercups. They carried large bunches of buttercups.
